

haul'd on our beam, and we got our Fore and Aft sails set about this time A sail was reported on our Port Bow. she was A schooner but night coming on we did not speall her

Friday April 1st /04.

This morning cloudy and cool we took the wind on our beam, carrying our Fore and Aft sails until about 8 O'clock when the wind haul'd ahead and we were obliged to take in sail. at daylight there was two sails in sight. but by 12 O'clock. we counted 22. land was reported earley this morning After dinner they holly-stoned decks and scraped spars. and otherwise put things in order. at 6 O'clock we made the Highland light. we stop'd several times to take soundings. late this evening. sat all our Fore and Aft sails. which helped us along A great deal. we took aboard A Pilot at 7 O'clock. and bore down for the Bar.

Saturday April 2nd

We Anchord of the Bar about 1 O'clock last night. but got under way by 5 O'clock we took aboard another Pilot this morning. and crossed the Bay by 6 O'clock. by 7 O'clock we passed through the Narrows and Anchored of Wall street Ferry at half past eight. To day while trying to moore ship. we lost one of our Anchors. and sixty fathoms of chain. Two of our Ensigns Meesers. Hoff and Harrington. is ordered to return to the Naval Academy. and two other mess chew. ordered to the South Atlantic Squadron and Blalle. to the North Atlantic Squadron. Mail'd A letter to C.W.R. I received A letter from C.W.R. W.H.S. C.S.B. J Ha. With much regret I heard of the death H.J. Brisar. he died on the 26th of March. of Consumption. at Camp Meigs. Readville. Mass. he being a private Co. A 5th Regmt Mass. Cavalry.

Sunday April the 3rd

It being so stormy yesterday we could not moov

ship. we went to work at it again to day. in the Afternoon I went ashore and visited W^m M^r. S^r. at New York. also M^r. E^r. Brooklyn.

Monday April 4th

To day quite cold and rainy. in the Afternoon I went ashore. went to New York. departure of Mr. Harrington.

Tuesday April 5th

Quite cold. went ashore in afternoon. took a walk through Fifth Avenue. and others of the aristocratic streets. passed through 14th street where they are holding the great Sanitary Fair. for the benefit of disable soldiers. I visited the Office of the Anglo-African. I remaind ashore all night as I was not in time for the sun down boat.

Wednesday April 6th

This Morning all hands were called at three bells. I forgot to mention above that Dr Maxwell came on board on Tuesday and commenced duties also that two Ensigns reported for duty on yesterday

Thursday April 7th

A very fine day. we unbend all of our sails and hoisted them. The Russian Admiral. and his Fleet Captain. and Flag Lieutenant. come on board to take a look at the ship. we were prepared to give them a salute but did not on account of the absence of Commodore Craven. in the Afternoon some of our Officers. went on board of the Russian Flag Ship. to a party.

Friday April 8th

A very fine day. we took in Water. from the supply boat received a letter from C.W.R. went ashore in the evening.

Saturday April 9th

I returned on board to day we holystoned and had a general cleaning. the Men's time is fast expiring and every day there is some leaving with a general exclamation that they will never enter the Navy again. would that I was in their stead. in the evening it changed quite cool with very strong winds. quite a gale.

Sunday April 10th

Quite cool. windy and Rainy. in all A very disagreeable day. we had service at 11 O'clock. write A letter to C.W.R. To Mother. and one to J.M.

Monday April 11th

Cold, and Rainy. Today workmen came on board and commenced to make such repairs as are needed in the afternoon I went on shore. and went up to Union Square visited the Office of the Anglo.

Tuesday April 12th

I returned on board this morning. Received A letter from A.C.H. quite unwell we commenced to transport guns. from forward to aft.

Wednesday April 13th

this morning cold and wet sleetting. late in the evening it changed to snow. then to rain very disagreeable. Received A letters from C.W.R. and one from G.L.M.

Thursday April 14th

A very fine day wrote to W.H.S. C.B. and J.R. and C.W.R. went ashore in the afternoon visited

A.C.H. returned on board at sun set.

Friday April 15th

A beautiful day. Spring commences to put forth in her beautiful dress of green. A coal Barge came along side, and we commence to coal ship. in the afternoon another Barge came along side and we could fire both sides. in the evening I went ashore. and visited Mrs H.

Saturday April 16th

I ~~stayed~~ ~~aboard~~ this Morning. coaling ship. this Morning we heard of A dreadful accident that occurred in the lower Bay yesterday evening the the new Double Endr. "Chenango" while proceeding down the Bay exploded her Boiler. Injuring the ship Badly. and scalding all of her Engineers. and Firemans. about thirty six in all. they were brought up to the Hospital where about twenty died to day. we also heard of the capture of Fort Pillow. by the Rebels and the Massacre of all the troops. both White. and Colard. still the Goverment do not Retaliate.

Sunday April 17th

Quite A fine day. but we cannot enjoy the day.

we had service at ten o'clock. wrote a letter to C.H.S.
and one to A.C.H. felt very unwell. to day obliged to
take Medicine.

Monday April 18th

To day Ringers came on board and commence work
on our Rigging. taking in Coal. fine day. went
on shore in afternoon.

Tuesday April 19th

Returned on board this morning. still coaling
this evening the Double Turreted Monitor.
"Onondaga." went to sea under the convoy of the
Tug Boat Boose. and Gun Boat. Mattabessett.

Wednesday April 20th

Still coaling heard of they intend making us
A receiving Ship.

Thursday April 21st

Coaling still. Received A letter from George Rice.
quite well finished coaling late in the evening

Friday April 22nd

We got Regallant Mast and Yards ready to send
up. Stoney stoned decks. the Italian Minister came

on board. on his departure he was saluted with
Eleven guns.

Saturday April 23rd

Very fine day went ashore in afternoon visited the
Office of the Anglo. also hears of the Rebel Ram.
descended the Potowat. and destroyed the Union
Gun Boats. "Bombshell" and Southfield. and dis-
abled the "Miamma". I returned on board at night

Sunday April 24th

To day A very fine day. we had service at ten
o'clock. yesterday. A summary Court Martial con-
vened to try. Michal Simmons. for Desertion.
and another man for ^{theft} wrote A letter to G.S.M.
and one to G.W.P.

Monday April 25th

To day raining but warm. in the afternoon. we received
26. Seamen. 6 Cholinary. Seamen and 5 Handmen
wich is quite an addition to our crew

Tuesday April 26th

Still raining heard of the capture of Plymouth by
the Rebels. and a report of the Massacre of

both White and colored soldiers, belonging to North Carolina, commenced to send up Flagrant Rigging went ashore in afternoon, remaind all Night.

Wednesday April 27th

I returned on board this Morning. Riggers from the yard came on board and sent up Flagrant Mast and tare down Rigging.

Thursday April 28th

We tare down Rigging, and also seized on Rattlers paint ship. All hand were musted to hear the sentence of the Court Martial, in the case of Michael Simmons, for desertion, loss of three Month's pay, (90) day close confinement on bread and water.

for stealing a shirt, (80) day close confinement, loss of one Month's pay.).

Friday April 29th

We finished taring down Rigging, prepare to put the ship in order, heard of the arrival of the Italian Ship of the line "Re. Galantuomo," at Beaufort. Received a letter from G. M. and Picture, went ashore in the afternoon, visited Mrs. C. and Mrs. W. and Mrs. H.

Saturday April 30th

I returned on board this morning, heard from J.M. Received a letter from G.W.S. heard of the destruction of the Rebel Salt Works, by the Blockade Fleet near Wilmington, on Masonboro. Sound, ^{sunday May 1st} went ashore in the Evening went to Fleet street church, heard Rev. Mr. Garnet.

Sunday May 1st

A very fine day. Quakers and Inspection, at 10 O'clock. Service at 10^{1/2} O'clock, see above.

Monday May 2nd

I return on board this morning, a very fine day, this being the Birth day of the Pushan Emperor we hoisted the Pushan Flag at our Fore and at noon fired a salute of thirty one (31) guns in honor of the occasion, all the Pushan Ships were gaily decked out with Flags and wasted a great quantity of Powder.

Tuesday May 3rd

This Morning raining and quite cold for this season heard of the evacuation of Washington, N.C.
